In the early decades of the 19th century, the hearts of honest men, newly liberated politically and severed as well from a state religion, began to search for truth in an unfettered environment. Among them was a Virginian by the name of James O’Kelly. In 1774, a circuit-riding preacher of the Methodist Episcopal denomination preached a sermon that brought about O’Kelly’s conversion. By 1777, he was himself a circuit rider working largely in North Carolina. During the Revolutionary War, he traveled extensively, preaching to open-air audiences wherever opportunities arose.

On December 25, 1784, at what is now famously known as the “Christmas Conference,” a letter from Charles Wesley was read that officially released his Methodist followers from all ties and obligations to the Episcopal Church and also appointed Thomas Coke and Francis Asbury as Co-Superintendents of the Methodist churches in America. Asbury proved to be very autocratic in leadership style, appointing preachers to circuits of his choosing without regard to their situations. O’Kelly opposed the arrangement. In time he became convinced that Scripture does not authorize one man to have power over all the congregations. By late 1792, the disagreements between the two had reached a breaking point. O’Kelly and a small group of preachers walked out of the Baltimore Conference. The following year, he organized a group known as the Republican Methodist Church. Within another year, the group voted to drop the name and be known simply as Christians. The group also determined that Scripture authorized a plurality of elders to be over each local body.

O’Kelly’s Bible studies led him to renounce much of what he had been taught as a denominationalist. He soon rejected the Calvinist belief of Original Sin. He also argued against Unconditional Election stating “If there be a secret number of souls unconditionally elected, such were never to be lost. But Christ came to

seek and to save the lost.” He denounced Irresistible Grace, insisting that faith comes by hearing and obeying the gospel. O’Kelly also opposed instruments of music in the churches.



As the frontier opened up present-day Kentucky and Tennessee, the need for preachers became desperate. A spiritual movement began to stir. Barton W. Stone and James O’Kelly met and began to share their views with each other. Thus, the famous Cane Ridge Revival was influenced to some degree by the convictions of O’Kelly.

The one doctrine he would not abandon is the need for adult immersion for salvation. However, the clear teaching of Scripture on the subject caused a large number to break with his movement, taking the name Christian Baptist for their insistence on the necessity of baptism.

What does this mean for you and me today? Several things come to mind. First, it proves beyond doubt that members of the church of Christ did not originate with Thomas or Alexander Campbell. Movements to get back to the Bible were happening in the New England states, the central states, and the southern states by men from different denominational backgrounds who chose Scripture over creeds. Second, it demonstrates that no matter how complex or widely embraced a doctrine may be, it only takes an honest heart to study Scriptures and distinguish error from truth. Calvinism was easily disproved by preaching from Scripture. Third, the gospel never loses its power to convict men of sin and point men to salvation. The lawlessness of the frontier and the dominance of denominationalism in the coastal states were both conquered by preaching the word of God. We don’t live in the horse-and-buggy days of O’Kelly, Stone, Campbell, Scott, and others like them. But we do live in a lawless frontier, and the hold of denominationalism is ever-present. Just going back to the Bible for our authority will have the same effect today as it did back then.
